

Evidencing the Impact of the Primary PE and Sport Premium 2024–25

Windlesham Village Infant School

Total Allocation for 2024–25

- Total PE and Sport Premium received: £16,490
- Carried forward from previous year: £0
- Total spent by 31st July 2025: £16, 258.71
- Remaining balance: £231.29

Review of 2024–25

- All pupils had access to Forest School across the year, developing teamwork and risk-taking within safe boundaries.
- Corefulness online daily movement programme supported classroom focus and physical regulation.
- Lunchtime Playball club increased engagement, particularly for pupils less confident in traditional games.
- A new AstroTurf surface allowed safer, more consistent physical activity and improved playtime opportunities.
- Competitive sports events were sustained, including transport to Crawley Ridge Infant School and holiday club support for a disadvantaged pupil.
- Teaching staff used the 'Get Set 4 PE' planning tool to deliver structured, progressive PE lessons.
- Physical activity was embedded across the day through active play, curriculum-linked movement, and lunchtime initiatives.

Key Indicator 1: Engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity

% of allocation: 90%

Spend includes:

- Astroturf installation: £10,572
- Forest School sessions: £2,240
- Playball Lunchtime Club: £1,557
- Corefulness Programme: £192
- Coach to CRIS: £295

Actions Taken:

- Delivered weekly Forest School in rotation for each class.

- Provided lunchtime club with Playball coach.
- Used Corefulness videos twice daily in classrooms.
- Replaced and improved playground surface (Astroturf).
- Ensured all pupils participated in active play every day.

Impact:

- Children showed improved coordination, risk awareness, and independence.
- Forest School continued to enrich the curriculum, particularly in Science.
- Corefulness gave a calming and physically active structure to classroom transitions.
- Astroturf improved safety and usability of the outdoor space.
- Children accessed consistent movement opportunities each day.

Key Indicator 2: Raising the profile of PE and sport across the school

Spend embedded within broader initiatives

Examples:

- School Council involvement in equipment decisions
- Sports Day as part of whole-school Health Week
- Pirate Ship outdoor equipment used for imaginative, physical play
- Events included team-based carousel activities with high family engagement

Impact:

- Pupils spoke positively about their sporting experiences.
- Families valued seeing physical activity as a central part of school life.
- High visibility of physical activity encouraged inclusive participation.

Key Indicator 3: Increased confidence, knowledge, and skills of staff in teaching PE

Spend embedded in broader resources

- Use of Get Set 4 PE and CPD built into ongoing practice

Impact:

- Teachers reported improved confidence using online planning and visual aids.
- Staff felt better able to deliver structured, skills-based PE lessons.

Key Indicator 4: Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to pupils

Spend includes:

- Forest School (detailed above)
- Bespoke Pirate Ship equipment (from 2023–24)
- Extra-curricular sports day, hobby horse gymkhana, and holiday club support
- Complete Kids Coaches for Sports Day: £120
- PP Holiday Club Place: £150

Impact:

- Pupils experienced both structured and imaginative physical activity.

- All children took part in events like the Reception Gymkhana and Football Festivals.
- Disadvantaged pupils accessed high-quality sports activities without cost barriers.

Key Indicator 5: Increased participation in competitive sport

Spend includes:

- Coach travel to CRIS: £295
- Festival participation and internal competitions (supported by coaches)

Impact:

- All Year 2 children participated in friendly inter-school festivals.
- Sporting events encouraged collaboration with partner schools.
- Children learned about fair play, teamwork, and resilience.
